CITY OF NEENAH PUBLIC SERVICES AND SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES Tuesday, July 25, 2017 - 7:00 PM Hauser Room - City Administration Building

Present: Aldermen Bates, Hillstrom, Lang, Lendrum, and Stevenson

Also Present: Mayor Kaufert, City Attorney Godlewski, Director of Public Works Kaiser, Director of Community Development and Assessment Haese, Superintendent of Parks Fink, Traffic Engineer Merten, Alderman Pollnow, Alderman Boyette

Minutes: Motion/Second/Carried Hillstrom/Lendrum to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting of July 11, 2017. All voting aye.

Public Appearances: None.

We Energies Utility Easement - Memorial Park: Committee reviewed Superintendent Fink's July 21, 2017, memo. We Energies has requested a 15-foot wide easement strip at the northwest corner of Memorial Park (Gay Drive/Pendleton Road) to install a switch/vacuum fault interrupter (VFI) cabinet. The cabinet is 7 feet wide by 7 feet deep by 4 feet tall. It is proposed to be installed behind the Memorial Park sign located at the corner. The unit is part of a plan to provide service to the Pendleton Park development. We Energies will pay \$1,500 toward landscaping around the unit. Superintendent Fink stated that the Parks & Recreation Commission recommended approval of the easement. Committee discussed measures to disguise the cabinet. Ald. Stevenson questioned if a location closer to the park maintenance building had been considered. Superintendent Fink indicated that he was unaware if it had. Committee noted that the Parks & Recreation Commission would need to approve any other location for the VFI.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Stevenson/Lendrum to table the item and direct staff to discuss with We Energies the possibility of locating the VFI cabinet near the maintenance building area. All voting aye.

Cumings Plat MOU Sewer Agreement: Committee reviewed City Attorney Godlewski's July 20, 2017, memo regarding the Cumings Plat sewer collector memorandum of understanding with Sanitary District 2. The MOU provides for the construction of a sanitary sewer collector extending south from Cumings Lane. This collector would be connected to an extension of the existing Breezewood Lane interceptor. Construction of this collector will allow the District to abandon their existing lift station on Cumings Lane, which has experienced capacity problems. He reviewed the provisions of the agreement and clarified the alignment shown for the collector line. He stated that staff is developing a prospective street layout for the area which will allow the collector to be constructed within a future road right-of-way. Mayor Kaufert discussed the overall goals of the project. City Attorney Godlewski noted the MOU provision that allows the City access to an existing District easement that extends east of Woodside Lane. Director Kaiser reviewed the potential future use for that easement. Ald. Pollnow addressed the Committee to question if a 3/4 approving vote of the Council would be needed since the project could be a budget amendment. City Attorney Godlewski noted that construction is most likely to occur in 2018, in which case it could be included in the upcoming budget.

If things were to progress in a way that allowed construction in 2017, then a ¾ vote would be required for approval. Committee questioned the project cap included in the MOU. City Attorney Godlewski stated that there is high bedrock in the area that could increase the project construction cost. Director Kaiser stated that soil borings would be taken when legal access is acquired. Committee questioned the MOU provision that allows the District to upgrade the existing Cumings lift station if the collector project falls through. Director Kaiser reviewed the history of the project and the prior development of operational protocols for the lift station.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Hillstrom/Stevenson to recommend Council approve the Cumings Plat Sewer Collector memorandum of understanding. All voting aye.

Street Use Permit - Great Pumpkin Run: Committee reviewed the Street Use Permit for the Great Pumpkin Run (formerly the Plexus Run) to be held on October 7, 2017. As requested at the July 11, 2017, Public Services and Safety Committee meeting, Traffic Engineer Merten clarified the tax exempt status of the sponsor and provided information on the recipient of the event proceeds. He stated that the organization does not currently have 501(c) status but is in the process of applying for that. He stated that the event proceeds are being directed to the Christine Ann Emergency Shelter. Committee discussed concerns with events that use city facilities but provide event proceeds to facilities or organizations outside of the City. They noted that there a number of non-profits in the City that could benefit from this financial assistance. Mayor Kaufert reminded the Committee that City residents may benefit from the services offered by these organizations even if they are not located in the City.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Lendrum/Hillstrom to recommend the Chairman of the Public Services and Safety Committee sign and the Council approve the Street Use Permit the Great Pumpkin Run, Gloria West, DuTriRun Foundation, 920 Keller Park Drive, Appleton, to be held on October 7, 2017, with the fee schedule applied as a for-profit entity. All voting aye.

Outdoor Extension of Class B Premise Application - Lion's Tail Brewing Company: Committee reviewed the request for an outdoor extension of a Class B premise from Lion's Tail Brewing Co. Committee discussed the application and the location of the outdoor extension on the site. Mayor Kaufert noted that patron service would need to occur within the extension area. Chairman Bates requested that Director Kaiser determine if a gate to the outdoor seating area was required. (Note: A gate is not required. Section 4-106(3) reads in part: "Openings in the outdoor area shall not require installation of gates, but any opening where persons may pass from the outdoor area to an unlicensed area shall contain signs indicating that open intoxicants are prohibited beyond the licensed premises." In this case, the business is installing the appropriate sign.)

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Stevenson/Lang to recommend Council grant an Outdoor Extension of a Retail Class B Beer and Wine License to Lion's Tail Brewing Company, 116 S. Commercial Street, Alexander Wenzel. All voting aye.

Public Works General Construction and Department Activity:

- Contract 1-17 (Cecil St, Higgins Av) Utilities have been installed, pavement has been placed. Landscaping is scheduled for the week of July 24 with pavement marking to follow. Anticipated opening date is August 31.
- 2. Contract 2-17 (Edward, Helen, Cleveland) All work is complete.
- 3. Contract 3-17 (Main Street Lot, Temple Lot, Whippoorwill, Yorkshire, Bergstrom Rd Trail)
 - a. Main Street Parking Lot Work is complete. Landscaping is separate from this contract.
 - b. Bergstrom Road Trail About 40% of the trail has been paved. Excavating is ongoing for the south half of the work. Mayor Kaufert related a question he had received about the trail grade near the warehouses.
 - c. Temple Lot The existing surface was pulverized on July 20.
- 4. Contract 4-17 (Industrial Drive Pavement Repair) Patching work is complete. Diamond grinding is scheduled for completion early the week of July 24.
- 5. Contract 5-17 (Cecil Street Overpass Approaches) Bridge repairs and approaches are complete. Sidewalk pouring and landscaping are scheduled for completion the week of July 24. Anticipated opening date is August 31.
- 6. 308 Caroline The sewer main and lateral have been televised. We have not yet received the recording to review. The verbal report from the televising contractor was that there did not appear to be any faults in those lines.
- 7. Castle Oak V Utility installation is complete. Street grading/graveling will take place over the next couple of weeks.
- 8. Forest Manor Street Lighting Underground cable and street light pole installation are complete. Light fixtures have not yet been installed.
- 9. Pavement and Sidewalk repair contracts are being prepared. They are scheduled for a mid-August award.
- 10. Drop-off Attendant One of our drop-off attendants has resigned. We are advertising for another attendant.

11. Sanitary Sewer Rate Study - Staff is meeting with the consultant on July 26 to review progress on the study.

Announcements/Future Agenda Items:

Chairman Bates informed the Committee that she asked staff to consider the possibility of allowing parking on Bell Street near S. Park Avenue. She would like a report from staff at the next available committee meeting.

Chairman Bates requested that staff provide the ordinance updates necessary to implement the sidewalk criteria.

This Stipulated Settlement entered into this _____ day of August, 2017 by and between the City of Neenah, a Wisconsin municipal corporation with offices at 211 Walnut Street, Neenah, WI 54956 (the "City" or "Petitioner) and Tho Kin Tho, LLC, d/b/a Lucky Dog'z (the "Respondent").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Respondent was granted a "Class B" combination license (the "License") for the premises located at 157 South Green Bay Road, Neenah, WI (the "Premises") for the July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017 license year;, which was recently renewed through June 30, 2018 and,

WHEREAS, on May 14, 2017, a patron of Respondent left the Premises in an allegedly inebriated state and proceeded to operate a motor vehicle; and,

WHEREAS, another patron of Respondent alerted Neenah police of the potential traffic violation. When employees and agent of Respondent (hereinafter referred to as "Agent") found out about the reporting patron's call to police, they proceeded to taunt and harass the reporting patron for being a "snitch" and allegedly attempting to intimidate the reporting patron from cooperating with police in the prosecution of the alleged operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated violation the reporting patron observed, as more particularly described in Neenah Police Incident No. NP17-006555; and,

WHEREAS, the actions of Respondent's Agent and employees violated the conditions Respondent accepted its license contrary to Neenah Code §4-101; and,

WHEREAS, the parties hereto wish to settle this matter through this stipulation as a reasonable compromise of their dispute; and,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties agree to the following terms and conditions.

- 1. <u>RECITALS.</u> The above recitals are incorporated into and made a part of this agreement as if fully set forth herein. The Respondent acknowledges the accuracy of the statements contained in the recitals and in Neenah Police Incident Report No. NP17-006555.
- 2. <u>LICENSE SUSPENSION.</u> The Respondent accepts suspension of the License for three (3) days which will be held in abeyance for two (2) years. Provided Respondent, Respondent's Agent and employees (collectively referred to as "Respondent") do not violate the conditions of Respondent's license and the terms of this .stipulation for two (2) years from the date of this Stipulation, the suspension imposed under this paragraph shall be considered satisfied. However, should Respondent violate the conditions of the license or any provision of law applicable to Respondent's license or the Premises, then the City may impose the suspension under this paragraph in addition to any penalty imposed for such future violation.
- 3. <u>DISQUALIFIED PERSONS.</u> In order to insure order to Respondent's Premises, Respondent shall ban the following patrons from the premises until October 15, 2017: Wendy Anderson, and Jeffery Anderson.
- 4. <u>SERVER TRAINING.</u> Respondent shall conduct training for its employees proper way to handle contacts with the police department responding to issues; emphasizing the requirement for licensees to allow police inspections to insure compliance with the law.as required by Neenah Code §4-101. Said training shall include training regarding the prohibition on serving intoxicated persons found at Wis. Stat. §125.07(2).
- 5. <u>SIGN & SOCIAL MEDIA.</u> Respondent shall post a sign in several conspicuous locations that states Respondent's goal for responsible and safe operation. The sign shall contain the following statement:

We at Lucky Dog'z want our patrons to enjoy themselves responsibly while they are here. We also want them to be safe. To that end, we believe that the best way to keep everyone safe is to make sure we don't over-serve our patrons. It takes a whole community to take care of each other, and that includes our police department. We will continue our positive relationship with the Neenah Police as they help us keep everyone safe.

The statement shall also be posted on Respondent's social media pages, such as Facebook, Twitter. Etc.

- 6. <u>INSPECTIONS.</u> Respondent agrees to cooperate with requests by City of Neenah officials, including police officers, to conduct inspections pursuant to Neenah Code §4-100(1).
- 7. <u>DEFAULT.</u> In the event that Respondent fails to meet any of the conditions listed in this agreement that shall constitute an immediate suspension of the License by Respondent without further process in accordance with the terms of Paragraph 2. Respondent acknowledges that in consideration of the City's agreement to forestall a license suspension/revocation hearing Respondent willingly and knowingly waives its rights to any further hearing or proceedings on its License and specifically waives its rights to a hearing for revocation under Wis. Stat. §125.12.





- 1. Purpose: The purpose of this easement is to install, operate, maintain, repair, replace and extend underground utility facilities, conduit and cables, electric pad-mounted transformers, manhole, electric pad-mounted switch-fuse units, electric pad-mounted vacuum fault interrupter, concrete slabs, power pedestals, riser equipment, terminals and markers, together with all necessary and appurtenant equipment under and above ground as deemed necessary by Grantee, all to transmit electric energy, signals, television and telecommunication services, including the customary growth and replacement thereof. Trees, bushes, branches and roots may be trimmed or removed so as not to interfere with Grantee's use of the easement area.
- 2. Access: Grantee or its agents shall have the right to enter and use Grantor's land with full right of ingress and egress over and across the easement area and adjacent lands of Grantor for the purpose of exercising its rights in the easement area.
- 3. Buildings or Other Structures: Grantor agrees that no structures will be erected in the easement area or in such close proximity to Grantee's facilities as to create a violation of all applicable State of Wisconsin electric codes or any amendments thereto.
- **4. Elevation:** Grantor agrees that the elevation of the ground surface existing as of the date of the initial installation of Grantee's facilities within the easement area will not be altered by more than 4 inches without the written consent of Grantee.
- **5. Restoration:** Grantee agrees to restore or cause to have restored Grantor's land, as nearly as is reasonably possible, to the condition existing prior to such entry by Grantee or its agents. This restoration, however, does not apply to any trees, bushes, branches or roots which may interfere with Grantee's use of the easement area.
- **6. Exercise of Rights:** It is agreed that the complete exercise of the rights herein conveyed may be gradual and not fully exercised until some time in the future, and that none of the rights herein granted shall be lost by non-use.
- 7. Binding on Future Parties: This grant of easement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, successors and assigns of all parties hereto.

- 8. Indemnify and Hold Harmless: In consideration of the foregoing grant, it is understood that during the time said underground electrical facilities are located on the premises of the grantor pursuant to this grant, Wisconsin Electric Power Company will indemnify and save the grantor, its successors and assigns harmless from any and all claims for injury or death to any person or for damage to property of any person arising out of grantee's exercise of any of its rights under this easement; excepting, however, any claims or actions arising out of negligence or willful acts on the part of the grantor, its successors and assigns, grantors employees, agents and invitees.

RE: Sidewalk Ordinance Revisions

At the last Committee of the Whole discussion of sidewalk criteria, a concept layout for a sidewalk criteria scoring system was presented (attached Exhibit A). Committee direction was to apply the criteria to the existing Sidewalk/Off-Street Trails map in order to prioritize installation. Committee also requested a review of current ordinance to determine the changes that were needed to incorporate the criteria methodology.

Section 14-57 of the Municipal Code is the current sidewalk ordinance. Generally speaking, the core of the ordinance is still applicable. There are three approaches that could be taken to it:

- 1. Maintain the ordinance as-is with the understanding that the prioritization criteria would be the basis for proposing sidewalk installation projects for future budgeting.
- 2. If there is a desire to incorporate the prioritization criteria, adjust the language in paragraph 9, which references the way that the Director recommends sidewalk projects to Council.
- 3. Make a more substantial modification of the ordinance. The following notes outline changes that could be considered (notes are in italics).

ARTICLE III. - SIDEWALK AND TRAIL CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR

Sec. 14-57. - Sidewalk or trail installation procedure; required locations.

Based upon input and recommendations from the planning and engineering departments, the City shall determine on which streets any sidewalks or trails are to be installed. The following quidelines shall be used to determine where sidewalks or trails are to be installed:

- 1. On both sides of all principal arterial streets as defined and mapped by the Department of Transportation functional classification system.
- 2. On one or both sides of all minor arterial streets as defined and mapped by the Department of Transportation functional classification system.
- 3. On one or both sides of collector streets as defined and mapped by the Department of Transportation functional classification system.

Adjustments: For these three paragraphs, the current language approximates the table "WisDOT Guidelines for Sidewalk Placement" contained in The Wisconsin Guide to Pedestrian Best Practices (Table 1). The table could be incorporated directly or by reference into the ordinance to bring our ordinance directly in line with WisDOT policy.

- 4. On one or both sides of neighborhood subcollector streets when any of the following criteria are met:
 - Designated by the City at the time of plat approval;
 - b. When unsafe conditions are determined by the City become present;
 - c. When the combined vehicle and pedestrian counts warrant sidewalk or trail installation.

Adjustments:

- 1. Delete the sub clauses. They are either redundant to other ordinance provisions or don't have a foundation for analysis.
- 2. Since WisDOT does not have a Neighborhood Subcollector classification, there are two approaches that could be taken with the remainder of this provision: note that subcollectors are to be determined by the City without listing specific criteria or list the criteria defining a neighborhood subcollector. These criteria would be generally based on the WisDOT classification methodology and would likely include factors in the prioritization criteria.
- 3. Clarify that this classification process only applies to streets platted prior to 2002.
- 5. In all areas where the combined traffic counts and pedestrian counts during peak periods result in sidewalks or trails being required by Department of Transportation standards, or where such counts indicate unsafe conditions.

Adjustment: Delete. I have not been able to locate a specific WisDOT sidewalk installation volume warrant. Per WisDOT policy, "For sidewalks, adjacent land use and density determines "Absence of Need", not actual pedestrian counts or projected pedestrians." By extension, it would seem that establishing a warrant incorporating pedestrian volumes could be similarly flawed. Rather they appear to view installation on more of a complete streets basis - looking at the overall scope of work, location, and cost impact of providing pedestrian facilities – using Table 1 as a guide.

6. On any street and in any area where the Common Council determines that unsafe or unusual conditions warrant sidewalk or trail installation.

Adjustment: None.

7. In all new development areas such as subdivisions, commercial, retail and industrial developments, planned development areas and redevelopment areas, sidewalks or trails shall be installed using criteria as set forth above.

Adjustment: Replace phrase "using criteria as set forth above" with "as established during site plan approval".

8. When sidewalks or trails are required in those areas described above, all approved plat maps, certified survey maps and site plans shall clearly indicate those streets or areas where sidewalks or trails are to be installed.

Adjustment: None

9. Annually, as part of the capital improvements budget, the Public Works Director shall compile a report outlining those existing streets that currently do not have sidewalks or trails that meet the requirements for sidewalk or trail installation. The Common Council shall review said report and systematically order, waive or defer sidewalk or trail installation, so that all areas of the City will comply with the installation guidelines set forth above by the year 2010. The Public Works Department and the Community Development Department shall prepare, for adoption, an official sidewalk/trail map depicting the areas where sidewalks/trails are required.

Adjustment:

- 1. Create a separate clause for the sidewalk/trail map.
- 2. Remove phrase assuming compliance with installation criteria by 2010.
- 3. Reflect use of the prioritization criteria for the report submitted to Council. The prioritization could be understood to be the basis for prioritization or could be more formally adopted as policy.
- 10. If a property does not meet the sidewalk or trail installation requirements, the property owner may petition the Common Council to authorize sidewalk or trail installation at 100 percent of the property owner's expense. Under no circumstances will the City fund the installation of discontinuous sidewalk.

Adjustment: None

11. Prior to installation of any sidewalk/trail pursuant to the foregoing section, the Department of Public Works shall notify each abutting property owner that a sidewalk/trail will be installed abutting their property. The notice shall be provided a minimum of 30 days prior to the commencement of the sidewalk/trail construction. This section applies only to non-assessable sidewalk/trail installation.

Adjustment: None

12. Sidewalk/trail installation costs shall be 100 percent assessable to abutting property owners, except in R-1 zoning districts in existence as of the date of the adoption of this article, where the abutting use is a permitted use under <u>Section 26-148</u> of this Code. In those areas, the abutting property owner shall be assessed one-third of the cost of sidewalk/trail installation with the remaining cost paid for by the City.

Adjustment: Section could be clarified to reflect that both sides of the street are assessed even if sidewalk is installed on just one side. If it is desired to collect all special assessment code provisions in one location, this section could be moved to Chapter 13 of the Municipal Code.

13. The Common Council may waive installation of sidewalks or trails on any of the above defined streets when circumstances dictate that sidewalk or trail installation is not practical, warranted or if a parallel pedestrian corridor exists or is planned.

Adjustment: Delete. If it is only Council inconsistency that has lead us once again to this review of sidewalk installation, then clearly defining rules for use by Council and staff eliminate the need for an "out" clause. If Council does not believe that sidewalk and trail installation have value, then a clause like this will simply lead us to visit the issue again in the near future. Two lines in WisDOT policy capture where our starting point should be in considering sidewalk installation:

- There are few areas within a city or village where it is not appropriate to include sidewalks.
- The decision not to include pedestrian accommodations should actually be the exception and not the rule.

(Code 1977, § 6.06(3))

RE: Traffic Truck Replacement

On Tuesday, August 1, the traffic truck was involved in a multi-vehicle crash at the intersection of Cecil Street and Commercial Street. The crash is still under investigation. In the incident, the traffic truck was struck broadside near the passenger door and sustained significant damage. While we are still awaiting final word from the insurance adjuster, preliminary indications are that the truck will be totaled. I am requesting permission to begin the purchase process for a new traffic truck contingent on the insurance determination that the involved truck is totaled.

RE: Parking Option on E. Bell Street

At the request of Public Services and Safety Chair Bates, staff have prepared a proposal for consideration to include parking on E. Bell Street, specifically on the south side near the condominiums on the east end of the street.

Currently, E. Bell Street is 48 feet wide, containing two 7.5' bike lanes and two 16.5' drive lanes as shown in the following link: https://streetmix.net/-/560364. In order to include parking along E. Bell Street, staff recommendation would be to convert the existing bike lanes into a parking lane and restripe new bike lanes utilizing the excess width from the drive lanes, as shown here: https://streetmix.net/-/560367. This conversion would require the least amount of changes to the existing pavement markings. While the request is to provide parking only on a portion of the street segment, staff recommends to apply the proposed layout, if directed by the Committee, to the entire segment of street for consistency, particularly from the driver's perspective.

Total estimated cost to reallocate lanes on E. Bell Street (S. Commercial Street to S. Park Avenue) such that parking can be provided on both sides is \$6,700. This includes \$1,500 in pavement marking removals, \$5,000 in new epoxy pavement markings, and roughly \$200 for signing changes.

If the Public Services and Safety Committee elected to make the changes, the work would be best completed as part of the next epoxy pavement marking contract in summer of 2018.

RE: 2017 Pavement Marking Contract Update

Given the workload involving the NuPark software implementation and the Plexus Neenah Design Center parking lot design before that, I haven't had the time to prepare the annual pavement marking contract. Given the current time of the year, any request for bids for pavement marking work would result in higher pricing and an installation date late in the year. It has been staff experience that pavement markings placed late in the year have resulted in poor performance. Therefore, I believe it is in the City's best interest not to contract any epoxy pavement marking work this year.

That said, there are several large street segments that currently need consideration for restriping including W. Bell Street (Industrial Dr. – S. Commercial St.), S. Commercial Street (Wisconsin Ave. – Winneconne Ave., Bell St. – S. Park Ave.), Harrison Street (W. Bell St. – W. Winneconne Ave.), W. Cecil Street (Bridgewood Dr. – Hunt Ave.). Thus, I will be asking Director Kaiser to make a request to carry forward the funds in the Traffic Control Outside Services Operating Account specifically for a 2018 pavement marking contract. The amount requested will be \$39,780 of the \$45,000 budgeted for 2017. (The remaining amount was used to install the crosswalk at the W. Wisconsin Avenue/Main Street corner.)

SECTION 3 - PROVISIONS AND TERMS

THIS PERMIT is intended to clarify the working relationship between the **Sponsor** of the special event and the **City of Neenah**. If the event requires street closures or re-routing of traffic, the Sponsor may be required to mail a notice to affected residences and businesses PRIOR to the Public Services & Safety meeting and two weeks PRIOR to the event.

A **CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE** covering the event must be provided by the **Sponsor**, naming the City of Neenah its officers, council members, agents, employees, and authorized volunteers as additional insured(s) with no exclusions. Any waivers of liability signed by participants of the event must also include the above underlined persons as included in the waiver of liability. A copy of such waiver shall be provided to the City.

STAFF needed to run the event are the responsibility of the **Sponsor**, except where the **City** determines that qualified personnel are required. **Sponsor** shall also be responsible for the City's reasonable service and/or equipment cost associated with the Event. The rates are calculated by the formula outlined in the ordinance.

EQUIPMENT needed to run the event will be the responsibility of the **Sponsor** except when city equipment, such as traffic barricades or cones are used, under the direction of the **City Traffic Engineer**. The cost to repair or replace lost or damaged equipment will be charged to the **Sponsor**.

The **Sponsor** is responsible for and any PERMIT issued is subject to the Sponsor Responsibilities as described in SECTION 5 of this application.

An **INVOICE** detailing charges for City services will be sent to the **Sponsor** following the event. The charges are determined from actual cost, not the estimate in SECTION 5 of this application. Payment is due within 30 days of the date of the invoice.

NO CHANGES may be made by the Sponsor, regarding items included in this AGREEMENT, unless written permission is attached to this document. When questions regarding this AGREEMENT arise, they should be directed to the appropriate Department. If questions arise during the event, and the Department representative is unavailable, the decision of City Staff on duty shall prevail.

SECTION 4 - LEGAL NOTICE

I understand the filing of this application does not ensure the issuance of this permit. I also understand that all Event organizers and participants must comply with all applicable city ordinances, traffic rules, park rules, state health laws, fire codes and liquor licensing regulations. Fees for park facilities, food sales permits, tent and fireworks permits are in addition to the fees submitted for the Street Use Permit Application. I further understand that an incomplete application may be cause for denial of the event.



- 3) Contract 3-17 (Main Street Lot, Bergstrom Rd Trail, Temple Lot, Whippoorwill, Yorkshire)
 - a) Main Street Parking Lot Work is complete. Landscaping is separate from this contract.
 - b) Bergstrom Road Trail About 70% of the trail has been paved. Excavating is ongoing for the remainder.
