The Common Council of the City of Neenah, Winnebago County, Wisconsin, met in regular session at 6:00 PM, June 3, 2026, in the Council Chambers of Neenah City Hall.

Mayor Borchardt is the chair.

Present: Council President Steiner, Aldermen Bruno, Erickson, Linski, Defferding, Pollnow, Ellis, and Weber. Staff present Director of Finance Rasmussen, Director of Community Development & Assessment Nieforth, Public Works Director Kaiser, City Attorney Rashid, and City Clerk Nagel.

Also Present: Parks & Recreation Director Kading, Fire Chief Teesch, Police Chief Olson, Assistant Police Chief Bernice, Police Captain Van Sambeek, City Civil Engineer Kummerow, and those on the attached sign-in sheets.

Mayor Borchardt called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

I. Roll Call and Pledge of Allegiance

The City Clerk called a voice roll call as the Mayor/Aldermen recorded their attendance in the RollCall-Pro System followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Alderman Bruno.

II. Presentations by Aldermanic District 2 Candidates to Council

Mayor Borchardt explained the voting process. The nine candidates would be narrowed down to three by secret ballot. Another vote would be taken on the three top nominated candidates. Then there would be a motion to appoint Alderman District 2 and a formal vote by Council.

Presentations were to be given in alphabetical order. Each candidate would be given five minutes to make a presentation the Council.

Aldermanic candidates Scott Becher, Betsy Ellenberger, Denis Kittel, Debbie Ludka, Mark Neuman, Dominic Renteria, Matt Stiltjes, and Jonathon Williams gave brief presentations as part of the application process to be appointed to fill the vacant District 2 aldermanic seat. The seat was vacated by Former Alderman Borchardt being elected Mayor. After the presentations had been given, a vote was taken for the eight candidates. It should be noted that Robert Wagoner was called to give his presentation but was not present.

The top three candidates in alphabetical order were Debbie Ludka, Mark Neuman, Dominic Renteria. A second secret ballot vote was taken of the top three candidates who received the two highest votes. Results were determined by Clerk Nagel, Director Rasmussen, and Mayor Borchardt who announced Mark Neuman received the highest number of votes.

- Motion by Alderman Ellis, seconded by Alderman Pollnow to appoint Mark Neuman Alderperson District 2 for the remainder of Former Alderperson Borchardt term ending April 2027. No discussion. Motion carried in a roll call vote, 8-0.**
- B. Swearing in of newly appointed District 2 Alderman.  
Clerk Nagel swore in Mark Neuman as the new District 2 Alderman. Alderman Neuman took his place at the dais.

**Seeing no objections, the above appointments were ordered approved as presented.**

**Seeing no objections, the above Minutes and Proceedings were ordered approved as written.**
- V. Public Forum
- A. Speakers should give their name and residential address (not mailing address) and are allowed five minutes to speak on any topic.  
Mayor Borchardt opened the public forum at 6:03 PM.
1. Lyn Biedermann, 1350 Green Acres Lane – Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. She expressed frustration over the lack of public awareness about the e-bike ordinance and its potential impact on the disabled community. She argues that banning e-bikes is discriminatory and highlight the importance of e-bikes for seniors and those with health conditions. Ms. Biedermann suggests that the ordinance should be revisited by the committee to include stakeholder input, and the need for responsible enforcement of existing laws rather than new restrictions.
  2. Mark Stano, 1257 Nature Trail Drive - Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. He expressed frustration over the lack of public awareness about the e-bike ordinance and the lack of understanding of e-bikes by decision makers. He points out that 42% of e-bike injuries are minors. He states that the

- ordinance's age limits are unrealistic. He shared a personal story about his wife's positive experience with e-bikes and the need for responsible e-bike usage.
3. Sara Maas, 615 Hansen Street – Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. Thanked the Council for listening and taking into consideration the community input from the last meeting. She expresses relief over Chief Olson's approach to e-bike enforcement.
  4. Scott Becher, 1061 Green Acres Lane - Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. He emphasized the need for better communication and outreach from the city to the residents on ordinances.
  5. Aaron Roecker 605 Elm Street - Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. He suggests that the ordinance is confusing and difficult to enforce, which could lead to more bicycle and e-bike bans. Mr. Roecker ask for clarification on the ordinance's restrictions and the potential legal issues.
  6. Dennis Kittel, 410 Kraft Street - Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. Mr. Kittel is president of the Fox Cities Greenways, and expressed disappointment over the lack of stakeholder involvement in the ordinance. He points out the challenges in enforcing regulations on e-bikes and the need for a focused ordinance. Mr. Kittel suggests that the ordinance should be refocused on sidewalks and allow e-bike usage on trails and roadways.
  7. Dale Biedermann, 1350 Green Acres Lane. Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. He shared his experience of riding e-bikes and suggests that the ordnance should be differentiated between e-bikes and e-motos. He emphasized the need for better enforcement of existing laws rather than creating new ones. Mr. Biedermann suggests that council members should experience riding e-bikes on local street to understand the issues better and requests that the ordinance be revisited for further review.
  8. Chris Amundson, 1759 Legacy Lane – Spoke on the road conditions in Freedom Meadows and Freedom Acres subdivisions. He expressed frustration over the city's maintenance of local roads and the lack of response to his complaints. He suggests a temporary 10mph speed limit on dirt roads for dust control. He emphasizes the health impact of dust on residents and the need for immediate action. Mr. Amundson mentions the potential impact on property values if the road conditions are not addressed.
  9. Matt Nechodom, 1763 Legacy Lane - Spoke on the road conditions in Freedom Meadows and Freedom Acres subdivisions. Mr. Nechodom shared his family's experience of moving to the area for better schools. He describes the daily health issues caused by dust and the need for temporary measures to improve conditions. He expresses concern about the long-term impact on their family's decision to stay in the area. Requests that the council prioritize road maintenance in the capital budget and implement temporary solutions.
  10. Bruce Dux, 1364 Harvest Moon Drive, Town of Neenah. Spoke on the proposed e-bike ordinance 2026-07. He believes the ordinance lacks common sense and could force riders to take more dangerous routes. He argues that the ordinance was passed without proper stakeholder input and criticized the process for being sneaky. Mr. Dux highlights the inconvenience of the ordinance on those who live

in the town and need to go to local stores, suggesting that the current wording could lead to increased risks for riders.

After additional calls for public comments, none were heard. Mayor Borchardt closed the Public Forum at 7:04 PM..

VI. Mayor/Council consideration of public forum issues

- A. Alderman Pollnow explained to the gallery that the Council often responds to public comments when the item appears on the agenda, therefore, the Council's silence at this point does not mean concerns brought up in public forum were ignored.
- B. Mayor Borchardt explained that these issues will be coming up on the agenda and that's when Council will have an opportunity to seek a deeper understanding of concerns raised during public forum. Mayor Borchardt asked for a brief update on efforts taken place in Freedom Meadows and Freedom Acres subdivision road concerns.
- C. Director Kaiser provided a report on the ongoing efforts to find a contractor for dust control on the roads and the potential need to modify equipment and source materials if a contractor is not found. Staff regularly monitors the situation and is addressing issues like speed and extra patrols, speed signs, and landscaping dumping. He emphasizes the importance of the calcium chloride issue and the efforts to resolve the dust problems and to prevent it from getting worse. Director Kaiser notes that the city is working on addressing the issues raised in public forum and that the process is ongoing.

VII. Unfinished Business

- A. Discussion, possible action, on staff recommendation to include the roads in Freedom Meadows and Freedom Acres subdivision in the 2028 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) in response to P2026-01 and P2026-02 Petitions. **(Roll Call Vote)**

**Motion by Alderman Pollnow to recommend including temporary roads in the 2027 CIP with a 50/50 cost share with the City of Neenah and residents of Freedom Acres. The motion was seconded by Alderman Weber.**

The council debated including temporary and permanent road solutions in the CIP.

Alderman Pollnow commented that although this is a not perfect solution, it's a way to get the issue dealt with quickly in the spring of 2027. This solution of a 2-inch mat with a 50/50 cost share is beneficial to the residents and buys 8-10 years' time before the permanent roads are installed.

Council President Steiner expressed he is in favor of taking action this evening to show the Council's commitment to fixing the issue. He is in favor of the 2028 permanent roads solution as it aligns with the capital budgeting process. The cost sharing is precedent setting and is not a road Council President Steiner would like to go down although it might be politically appealing, but it will cause issues with consistency in future. Council President Steiner will not be voting for this motion but is in favor of the 2028 permanent road solution.

Alderman Weber seconded the motion strictly for discussion purposes. Clarification was given the any action taken tonight on either of the petitions is for the roads to go through the CIP process in the fall. Mayor Borchardt clarified that the CIP is plan and that items need to o through the process and committees for final approval. Alderman Weber is not in favor of the cost share plan, and believes the road costs should be assessed; however, he is in favor of taking action tonight.

Alderman Pollnow emphasized the need for process improvements and the importance of enforcing agreements to prevent future issues.

Alderman Defferding supports the inclusion of the temporary roads in the CIP and the need to learn from the current situation to improve future processes.

Alderman Erickson asked Director Kaiser what can we do to current the situation if the developer does not follow the plan, what is the enforcement. Director Kaiser reiterated the information given at the last meeting of the city is using escrow set-aside for street maintenance that the city is doing. Since the city is doing the maintenance, crew and equipment time is charged to that escrow as well.

**Mayor Borchardt called the question.**

**Motion restated: Alderman Pollnow to recommend including temporary roads in the 2027 CIP with a 50/50 cost share with the City of Neenah and residents of Freedom Acres. The motion was seconded by Alderman Weber. Motion failed in a roll call vote, 4-5 with Aldermen Defferding, Pollnow, Weber, and Neuman voting aye; Aldermen Bruno, Erickson, Linski, Ellis, and Steiner voting nay.**

Mayor Borchardt asked if there were any other motions, if not, there is no action taken on this item at this meeting.

**Motion by Council President Steiner to include a permanent road solution into the 2028 CIP. The motion was seconded by Alderman Ellis.**

Alderman Defferding asked about the financial impacts to the CIP. Director Rasmussen explained the difference between temporary matters, which have a cost of \$800,000, and the permanent roads with a cost of \$4-\$6 million dollars. There would have to be some shuffling of roadwork in order to fit the cost of the permanent roads into the 2028 CIP. This is a unique situation because action is taking place outside CIP meetings and workshops.

Director Kaiser added that the CIP is a planning document and streets are moved one way or the other. This is a substantial project for whichever year it is slotted for completion. There isn't such an impact on the overall budget, but no matter which year it's included, the money will have to be made up.

Alderman Pollnow is not in favor of this solution as he sees it as reactionary government. Never before has the Council had a separate meeting to deal with road issues, drop everything, and change the CIP to include a \$6 million project. He will not support it.

Council President Steiner agrees that, yes, this is reactionary, but does not see a distinction between this reactionary decision and the reactionary discussion of putting in temporary roads. Either option is a response and we're trying to find a solution. Putting the permanent roads in the 2028 CIP is a consistent process showing that the city is committed to finding a solution. This is not unique or different from a budgeting perspective as items are shifted to realign with priorities.

Mayor Borchardt added that the roads will be assessed to the property owners by contract.

Alderman Pollnow provided a retort to Council President Steiner's reactionary question stating the difference is \$800,000 and \$4 - \$6 million decision for 2028. He noted this is a unique situation outside the CIP workshops and meetings.

Alderman Defferding acknowledges the need for budgeting and prioritizing, mentioning the impact on streets around the old Shattuck Middle School and public safety risks on Forest Avenue. He highlights the ripple effect on other streets like Higgins, Lauden, and Oak, and the potential for creating resentment among residents due to delayed repairs.

Directors Rasmussen and Kaiser clarify the assessment process. Assessments are paid back over an eight-year period requiring initial borrowing and interest on payments.

Alderman Ellis criticizes past councils for prioritizing politically correct decisions over what is best for the city. He suggests that future tax increases may be necessary to address infrastructure needs.

**Mayor Borchardt called the question.**

**Motion restated: Motion by Council President Steiner to include a permanent road solution into the 2028 CIP. The motion was seconded by Alderman Ellis. Motion carried in a roll call vote, 6-3, with Aldermen Linski, Defferding, Pollnow dissenting.**

Mayor Borchardt reiterated that the CIP is a plan, but this issue moving forward to that process.

- B. Discussion, possible action, to enact Ordinance 2026-07 regulating E-Bikes and E-Scooters, and mandating helmet wear by those users under Section 16 as amended by the City Attorney. (Attachment) **(Roll Call Vote)**  
**Motion by Alderman Ellis, seconded by Alderman Weber to approve Ordinance 2026-07 regulating E-Bikes and E-Scooters, and mandating helmet wear by those users under Section 16 as amended by the City Attorney.**

Alderman Ellis emphasized the need for a base foundation to guide police actions. He clarified that this ordinance does not ban e-bikes but rather keeps them off certain areas of the city, mainly the 100 and 200 block of E. Wisconsin Avenue downtown. This is done for pedestrian safety. Alderman Ellis is frustrated with the political implications brought into this ordinance and insists on passing the ordinance to protect people.

Alderman Defferding emphasizes the need for better public input and collaboration with neighboring municipalities. E-bikes are transportation for the future; they provide valid and feasible alternative for mobility for the handicap and elderly. Currently the City of Menasha is still in discussion of this ordinance. Alderman Defferding does not share the position of Alderman Ellis; he believes approval of the ordinance should wait until there is consensus with the neighboring municipalities.

**Motion to Amend: Motion by Alderman Defferding to table this item until the June 23rd Public Services and Safety Meeting in hopes that a Taskforce is created at this meeting to get more input from the public.**

**Point of Order: Alderman Pollnow clarified that an item cannot be tabled to a specific meeting. Attorney Rashid concurred. The motion can be tabled, and the Council can decide what to do with it.**

**Amended Motion Restated: Motion by Alderman Defferding to table this item. After calls for a second, no second was heard. Motion dies for lack of a second.**

Council President Steiner highlighted the process an ordinance has gone through and the importance of balancing safety with transportation needs. The Council heard the community and edits were made. It seems like the ordinance was rushed through because it was in the newspaper last week, but the reality is, the ordinance has gone through several iterations. The idea here is the most egregious, clearly unsafe individuals that are being reckless is where the concern lays not with the responsible riders. The police aren't going to be going out and ticketing every little thing they see, they don't have the resources to do so. The ordinance provides the city with a tool to hold people accountable for their negative behavior.

Alderman Pollnow expresses support for the collaborative approach but raises concerns about the status of where the other municipalities are at with approving this ordinance. Attorney Rashid advised Fox Crossing approved the ordinance a couple of weeks ago, and City of Menasha they are going to take it back to committee for further stakeholder input. He suspects the tweaks made by Neenah in the last two weeks will probably be the result in Menasha as well.

Police Chief Olson clarified that sidewalk riding is only restricted when the e-bike is under power. If the e-bike is not under power, sidewalks can be ridden. The only other restriction is the 100 and 200 blocks of E. Wisconsin Avenue, e-bikes have to be walked in those to blocks only. E-bikes are not banned from being ridden in the city. As long as the rider is peddling, the e-bike can be ridden on the sidewalk.

Alderman Defferding seeks clarification on the process for making decisions on e-bike restrictions for special events and the role of the traffic engineer. Since the city doesn't have a traffic engineer, how would those decisions be handled. Attorney Rashid confirms that the city indeed has a traffic engineer, he has always been a traffic engineer and is still a traffic engineer even whilst holding the title of director, Director Kaiser. Attorney Rashid continued the traffic engineer's decisions would not be an arbitrary one as it relates to special events, and any permanent changes to the ordinance would require council approval.

Alderman Defferding proposed ordinance language similar to the City of Kaukauna regarding any e-bike modification causing the e-bike to reclassified as an e-motorcycle. He questioned Attorney Rashid as to why that language wasn't included in this ordinance. Attorney Rashid answered adding that language would be redundant and confusing because of the definition of an e-bike included. Those 16-160 (b)(2) 1, 2, and 3. Those are the only devices that, aside from scooters, are regulated for use in the city. By that definition, those devices are incapable of reaching higher speeds. When a device is able to go higher speeds, the Police Department already treats it as an e-motorcycle which is addressed under state statutes. The city is not trying to regulate devices already regulated by state statute; we're trying to regulate e-bikes.

**Motion Restated: Motion by Alderman Ellis, seconded by Alderman Weber to approve Ordinance 2026-07 regulating E-Bikes and E-Scooters, and mandating helmet wear by those users under Section 16 as amended by the City Attorney. Motion carried in a roll call vote, 8-1 with Alderman Defferding dissenting.**


